Research examines the structural limits of computational approaches to human judgment in therapeutic, legal, and ethical contexts.

MAJOR INNOVATION

Founder of Modal Integrative Psychotherapy (MIP)

Developed a pioneering therapeutic methodology that applies modal logic to clinical practice, examining how therapeutic intervention transforms the space of possibilities available to clients. The approach integrates philosophical practice with psychotherapy and has been published with Palgrave Macmillan (2025) and Anthem Press (forthcoming 2026). Training programs in MIP are offered internationally through the Institute for Practical Humanities.
